

I see where the Maid-Rite building was is now a vacant lot, most of the taverns are gone[lots of memories there]but overall 10th is about how I remember it. Venturing on down to 37 seeing the old Dobbs building so rundown was a little dishearting and most of what I remember in that area was gone. I don't think Mom's was Mom's when I lived in MTV. Most of the buildings I can remember what was in them at the time when I went to school at West Salem in the 50's. I had a best friend that lived south of the Dobbs building by the name of Richard Morrison. His dad had a wielding business and also had a wielding gas and oxygen bottle route. If memory serves me right his busuness was right across the road from the Rocket Cafe and their home was next door to the wielding business.

About 46% of MVHS students are on free or reduced lunch. That doesn't mean they live in subsidized housing, but they are probably renters who pay no property taxes. It might also be noted that property taxes for mobile & modular homes are considerably less than traditionally built houses.

I live in a slightly above average priced home in Mt. Vernon, the extra \$150 a year in property taxes that a new school would have cost me would have been well worth it for this community to have something to feel proud of. I don't think I would have ever missed the \$10-\$20 bucks a year the safety sales tax was costing me, but I will miss having my streets maintained and having good fire and ambulance service.

What is there about the physical plant of MVHS to be proud of? Chagnon Gym? Not a chance, it is a laughing stock all over the state. I was reading a thread on a high school basketball forum the other day about the worst gyms in Illinois. Chagnon was mentioned more than any other single gymnasium on that thread. I can't think of one single physical characteristic that our students can feel good about the MVHS campus. We do have a nice baseball diamond at Klein Field, but it's not on the MVHS campus and was paid for by mostly private donations. For folks like ilmer & vernie who attended MVHS in the 50's, much of the campus you attended was only 20 or so years old (Buildings A, the gym & Auditorium) and F building was less than 10 years old. This is not the same school you remember. I have spent nearly every day since 1972 in this place and the crumbling, dingy atmosphere absolutely sucks the life out of you. Last night I had to cut my team's practice short because one the the heaters in the nasty, filty old warehouse where we must practice (with no locker rooms or showers) overheated and filled the room with smoke. I am still coughing up a lung on that one. When I started teaching, I said I would not leave MVHS bitter like most of the retirees I have witnessed over my 36 years here. I really hope I can do that. I have given my life to this place and in return it has afforded me a good living and a job that has for the most part been rewarding and satisfying, and my children received a good education here. However, over the last 7 or 8 years this place has changed, and not for the better. 91 more days.
